Marie Howard, the Pacific Coast Regional Representative of Contemplative Outreach Limited, skillfully guided 23 individual members representing 12 North County Prayer Groups through the visioning process. She was ably assisted by our Co-Coordinators, Sue and Chris Hagen.

The theme of the day was "Living our Vision Statement, Mission Statement and Core Values". Our goal was to iden-

tify ways in which CONSD can bring these

Marie began with a loving prayer to the Holy Spirit for guidance throughout the visioning process. She reviewed with us the 12 Principles of Spiritual Leadership that Centering Prayer inspires: discipline, vision, listening, courage, decision, humility, integrity, humor, inspirational power, wisdom, collaboration, and trust. She then outlined the organic nature of a chapter's growth. Although just 15 months old, our chapter already has reached a level of development usually found in chapters closer to 5 to 10 years of age. In other words, CONSD is in good shape! But where do we go from here?



Vision Statement

CONSD is a spiritual network of individuals and small faith communities committed to living the contemplative dimension of the gospel in everyday life through the practice of Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina. We identify with the Christian Contemplative Heritage. What is the next phase of our evolution? What do we see as the highest potential for our chapter? Through visioning, we could begin to address such questions.

The visioning process itself was dynamic and interactive. To begin, the members were divided into small discussion groups and rotated through the consideration of 3 major questions. At the end of each discussion period, every group reported its results to the entire body. This active participation by each attendee provided a wealth of valuable perspectives on the many issues raised.

In Question 1 we identified and celebrated CONSD's strengths, our successes, and our assets as a chapter. We also became aware that CONSD reflects many of the 12 Principles of Spiritual Leadership.

In Question 2 we identified the challenges, needs, issues, and opportunities that lie ahead which, if addressed, would achieve our goal of bringing the Vision and Mission Statements and Core Values into

the lives of our membership.

In Question 3 we created a <u>preliminary</u> Roadmap for action by prioritizingthe challenges/opportunities that had been identified. Seven major areas of need were singled out as having top priority: Centering Prayer Groups, Introductory Programs/ Special Events, Outreach, Spiritual Directors, Local Retreat Center, Help for Experienced CP Practitioners to Deepen Their Practice, and Fundraising.

To complete this visioning process and create the final Roadmap for Action: 2007-08, Chris and Sue agreed to create a survey for the CONSD website that would invite all CONSD members to give input to the leadership by further prioritizing the seven major areas of need and make any comments/suggestions for implementing these priorities.

Marie brought the visioning process to a close by providing a summary of the progress made this day and the next steps that should follow. She complimented CONSD on its strong sense of community.

Living Flame Program

At our recent CONSD Visioning Day numerous suggestions for us to consider in the future were made. One such suggestion concerned finding ways to provide more spiritual enrichment for the mature Centering Prayer practitioners. In an effort to meet this need we are considering offering the Living Flame 1 Program presented by Contemplative Outreach. Ltd. This Program is designed to be experiential as well as informational giving participants the opportunity to evaluate, validate and share their own experience of Centering Prayer in the context of community.

Prerequisites are attendance at an Introductory Program, a twice daily prayer practice of at least six months, familiarity with "Open Mind Open Heart" and the Spiritual Journey videotapes. Attendance at an Intensive Retreat is encouraged. The Program

consists of seven sessions, one session per month, from 9:00AM to 4:00PM and consistent attendance is essential. The sessions are as follows: Lectio Divina, Refinement of the Centering Prayer practice, Formation of the False Self, The False Self in Action, Divine Therapy, Night of Sense and the Welcoming Prayer

In order to meet the financial needs of this Program we would need at least 25 people. The estimated cost would be approximately \$250.00 per person and payment would need to be made in advance. Due to the growing interest of this Program we may not be able to offer it in our area until the fall of 2009. What Does The Contemplative Outreach Logo Mean?



The Contemplative Outreach logo is taken from the monogram of Job's Redeemer which is the symbol of patient waiting ("For I know that my Redeemer lives, and at last he will stand upon the earth." Job 19:25). It depicts the alpha and omega in the upper portion of the logo. The alpha and omega are symbols of God, the beginning and the end ("I am the first and I am the last; besides me there is no God." Isaiah 44:6). The cross is the symbol of our salvation. The flowers in the lower portion of the logo are symbols of the abundance of life and the resurrection. The circle is a sign of ongoing progress. The heart and soul of Centering Prayer is consenting to God's presence and action in our lives. The Alpha and Omega acknowledges that our God is at the center of our consent and being.

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The cross is a symbol of our dying to our thoughts and commentaries. In the letting go our false self gives way to the flowering of the new self. This is an ongoing process bringing us deeper into Divine Intimacy.

Like Job, our patient waiting and consenting will be our gift of gratitude.

This symbol has been seen in several different locations: on an ancient church in the land of Uz, the residence of Job; in the excavations of Old Jerusalem near the original stairs of the Temple; at the Southern Wall of the Old City near the Huldah Gates; and in the church of "Multiplication of the Loaves" in Galilee.

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The Need for Silence

We don't know how to take joy in simple things anymore because, frankly, we are sated. You and I have had so much thrown at us! Unless we choose to deliberately under-stimulate ourselves, I don't think we can reasonably talk about spirituality. We don't really taste, suffer, enjoy, feel the images that come our way. Descartes said, "I think, therefore I am." For us it is "I experience, therefore I am." But I'm pretty much convinced experiences don't change people; realization does. I think of all the powerful experiences that I've had. But only when I taste my experiences enough so they become realizations, do I change. That takes time and space. Put time and

space together and you have a new definition of silence. We've got to create some kind of space so our images can become realizations. Unless we choose silence, I don't think a lot of this is going to happen. I don't think we're going to become willing people. We become, instead, willful people, trying to make the world fit our needs. Will triumphs instead of the spirit. Silence alone is spacious enough to allow Spirit and to let go of will-fullness. Silence makes us willing instead of willful.

About Centering Prayer

The Sacred Word is a way of renewing your intention to open yourself to God and to accept God as God is. While this does not prevent anyone from praying in other forms at other times, the period of Centering Prayer is not the time to pray specifically for others. By opening yourself to God, you are implicitly praying for everyone past, present, and future. You are embracing the whole of creation. You are accepting all reality, beginning with God and with that part of your own reality of which you may not be generally aware, namely, the spiritual level of your being."

What Is Faith?

"Christian faith is a leap into the unknown. Experience confirms the wisdom of every act of trust. The alternation of the darkness of faith leading to understanding, and understanding illuminating the darkness of faith is the normal way that leads to the growth of faith. Like everyone else, God wants to be accepted as he is-and he happens to be infinite, incomprehensible, inexpressible. We have to accept him, then, in the darkness of faith. It is only when we can accept God as he is that we can give up the desire for spiritual experiences that we can feel. Faith is mature when we are at ease without particular experiences of God, when his presence is obvious without our having to reflect on it. One who has this faith simply opens his eyes and, wherever he looks, finds God."

The Sound of Sheer Silence

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The Lord said to Elijah "Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind there was an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire, and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. I Kings 19:11

The "sound of sheer silence", what a seemingly paradoxical description of the presence of God. When we think of a sound we naturally think of something that we can hear. One of the definitions of the word "sheer" is "diaphanous." The definition of "diaphanous" is "lacking definite form, without structure" and the word "silence" means the absence of any sound." So, how could Elijah, or for that matter, how can we hear a sound that cannot be heard? Fr. Keating's response is that God cannot be perceived by our human faculties. The sound of sheer silence is a different kind of sound, a sound that can only be heard when the internal chatter of our minds and the external noise in our environment are stilled. During Centering Prayer we free ourselves from our attraction to our thoughts and the sounds that surround us. Centering Prayer, then, is a method of prayer that leads us to the sound of sheer silence.
