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A Day of Visioning

Contemplative Dying Our dying is essential to our living

Many spiritual traditions and wisdom teachers suggest that our path through life is a journey of preparation for our physical, psychical, and spiritual process of dying and death. The implication of these teachings, however, is not only centered upon our life's trajectory into death, but also how we learn to integrate our present forms of unconscious dying into a conscious awareness of our daily living. Death is always moving within us, as well as life. *Thanatos* and *Eros* thrive simultaneously. "Life and death are one," exhorts Kahlil Gibran in his poem *On Death*, "even as the river and the sea are one."

In Tibetan Buddhism, one's conscious entrance into "clear-light mind" at the time of death is considered to be the result of a lifetime of dedicated meditation practice, and may be the foundation for the bridge that leads them through the intermediate dream-like space of the *bardo* – the liminal state of consciousness after death that stretches between our present life and the afterlife. One's preparation for death and for the process of dying is essential for the shape and form of their rebirth into the next life.

At the heart of the life and teachings of Christ we encounter the paschal mystery of self-emptying (*kenosis*), which many regard as the Christian path for transformation and salvation. The gospel narrative accounts suggest that the emptying of self is the lens for Christian identity: through the witnessing of Christ's journey into his suffering, death, and new creation / resurrection; as well as through the wisdom teachings of Christ himself, which declare that "those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matt. 16:25).

The path of contemplative prayer and meditation invites us into the mystery of our soul's continuous dance between death and life, particularly as we grow in conscious awareness of the expressions of our false self and allow for the possible emergence of our true self. In many ways, it is through the dying process of our false self that the God-image of our true self is born.

Through my daily work as a hospice spiritual counselor, I encounter the incredible and unique journeys of persons in the midst of their own dying process. And, often, it is through these transformative opportunities that the shadow of the false self is lost within the light of the true self. Birth occurs, even in the midst of death.

On October 27th of this year, it will be my honor to join with you as we gather to consider how the transformative dimensions of our own dying and living are encountered and faced through the practice of contemplative prayer and meditation. Through the teachings of various spiritual traditions, the wisdom of our own life experiences, and the intriguing insight of depth psychology, we will explore the shape that contemplative dying embodies within our lives.

Kahlil Gibran's words invite us in preparation: "You would know the secret of death. If you would indeed behold the spirit of death, open your heart wide unto the body of life."

Prayer Group Facilitator Support Meeting

On 3/31/07 ten prayer group facilitators gathered at the Lutheran Church of the Incarnation in Rancho Bernardo to support and affirm one another. We began with a period of Centering Prayer and then moved into our community building lunch. Our meeting began with a discussion of the need to bring Centering Prayer to the youth of our communities. Some members had experience with this endeavor and were able to share valuable ideas. Most certainly the need to engage our youth in Centering Prayer will continue to be a topic of discussion and action at future meetings. We next moved to a discussion of how to support Prayer Group Facilitators. From this discussion came the idea to have a Prayer Group Facilitator Resource Library. At this time the library will consist of the Spiritual Journey video tapes, the video tapes and written transcripts for the six continuing sessions as well as written summaries of the transcripts. We will be adding DVDs, CDs, and audio tapes in the near future. It was also mentioned that the "Guidelines for Christian Life, Growth, and Transformation" that begin on page 127 of Open Mind Open Heart is an excellent resource for responding to prayer group members questions. The final topic of discussion related to how to kindle interest in Centering Prayer in a church's congregation in order to either facilitate the growth of a new Centering Prayer group or facilitate members of a congregation to join an existing Centering Prayer group.

Some of the approaches that have been found to be helpful in the past are to have the Priest affirm Centering Prayer from the pulpit, have a member of the congregation who practices Centering Prayer give a testimony to the congregation as to how Centering Prayer is a positive influence in his/her life, ask the Priest for permission to give a brief presentation about Centering Prayer to the congregation at each service, provide a one hour presentation on Centering Prayer that is announced in the church bulletin as well as from the pulpit. It was also suggested to have a ten minute experience of Centering Prayer during presentation, and hour set up informational table outside of the church and be available to hand out literature and answer questions before and between each service. As you can see, at the Prayer Group Support and Affirmation meeting we come together and create a small faith community and truly support and affirm one another. Our next meeting is on 9/8/07 from 12:00 pm to 2:00 pm. The location will be announced. Sue and I encourage all Prayer Group Facilitators to attend these very important meetings. The ideas and needs expressed in these meetings provide the Servant Leadership Team the guidance it needs to support the Centering Prayer Groups. If you are not able to attend a meeting please send a representative from your prayer group.

Presenter Formation

Hi Everybody. My name is Kristin Andersen and I'm a member of the Murrieta Centering Prayer Group (extreme "North County"....Riverside County, actually). I'd like to take a minute to share with you my experience at this year's Formation Training in Encino.

The training is an intensive five day (with a beautiful silent retreat day in the middle) experience that was worth every bit of effort on my part to learn the teaching method of Centering Prayer. We started every day with two periods of Centering Prayer and silent breakfast. Silence was broken around 9:00 am with a presentation and Q and A led by Bonnie Shimizu (or Sister Linda Snow). We broke for lunch and had a few hours in the early afternoon to prepare our oral presentations. We met in our small groups from about 2:30-5:30 to practice Centering Prayer present the method to each other. We self-critiqued our performance and heard the constructive critique of our peers and leaders. Dinner was at 5:30 and then we met at 7:00 for more Q and A time.

While this may sound intense, I want to share with you my joy at having been involved in this event. When I met the attendees

(24 persons participated), I felt as if I had just met myself at a core level. These were true brothers and sisters. I don't know about you, but in my life, I don't have the occasion of meeting deep, mindful persons very often (no, I don't drive down to Contemplative Outreach events). I was amazed at the level of connectedness these people had to each other and the world in general. I didn't hear mindless chatter. Rather, when someone spoke, it was usually brief, to the point, and deeply meaningful, often filled with the wisdom of that person's whole life. I guess this would be the case, given these people had just spent around \$300 of their own money to receive training (that brings no financial reward) in a daily discipline that shapes and heals a person's life. I met Br. Roy, a priest and monk from Santa Barbara, whose soulful eyes and gentle, reserved voice spoke volumes about who he truly is. No words were needed, for I knew we were "of the same mind". There was Ivan who, along with Fr. Bernard, traveled from Sherbrooke, Quebec to be able to better minister to their 106 member Centering Prayer group!

Ivan lovely gave me opportunities to practice my rusty college French. I got to finally meet Sue Hagen, who I've always secretly feared was one of those "bureaucratic administrators" (sorry, Sue), but who I found out was a lovely soul full of a lifetime of experiences with contemplative ways (and not a bit bureaucratic!). Don and Deborah Hale were attendance. They are part of an Austin, Texas church founded and dedicated to teachings of Father Thomas. Additionally, there were people who flew in from Ohio and Florida to attend this training. What a dedicated bunch of contemplatives! If you have the opportunity to attend Formation **Training** in the future, I highly recommend that you do. I feel that I gained much more than a teaching method and I bet you'll feel that way as well.

Half Day of Prayer Reflections

A Body Praying

The meeting hall was aglow with candles and color. One large circle of chairs took up half the room, at the center of which was a quilt of brilliant undersea colors with candles set around it. The other half of the room was taken up by a labyrinth canvas covering the floor. Another display on the floor featured bowls, one filled with feathers and another with water, set around a small crucifix. Hanging on the walls were fabric collage mats composed of beads and bright colored fabrics. On tables set along the walls were tea candles softly illuminating an icon, a Madonna, a Last Supper. Chant music played on a CD player.

Vickie Swenson and I had just arrived for a morning prayer retreat at St. Gabriel's Church of Poway given by Contemplative Outreach of North San Diego. The retreat had not yet started, so we wandered around the room looking at the artwork and reading the Scriptures posted for study. Other women chatted quietly and had refreshments. We were delighted when AnnaMarie Trechter arrived, the only other one from our Fallbrook prayer group. Gradually the room filled with about 50 women and one man. I became impatient for the silence, for our God work to begin.

It began with Centering Prayer, a period of 20 minutes of silence, of being still and knowing God. It is this prayer that had brought us all together. Only recently did I learn about Centering Prayer. I find a refreshing freedom in releasing my time into God's time.

A formal break was not scheduled so each person was free to attend to her needs as needed. The refreshment table was deliberately set with simple foods that Jesus might have taken on a journey: nuts, fruits, breads.

The assembly was divided into three groups which rotated among three experiences: the labyrinth, the chant, and the movement. Walking on the labyrinth canvas carpet felt like entering another world. The switchback lines leading into and away from the center re-created in microcosm the journey of life. The chanting involved singing of the Psalms in unison and repetition. The movement with arms was done seated. The inhale and exhale of deep breaths was like the sound of a rush of a mighty wind.

At the end of the morning, reactions to the day's experiences were shared in a closing assembly: the labyrinth showed to me unintentionally that I may need to be in the same place twice. The chanting in the background gave a fluidity to all three experiences. The breathing and moving exercises released a tightness in my body. Walking prayerfully provided me a spiritual motivation for physical exercise.

Perhaps the day's instruction was best expressed by the psalmist. "Return, O my soul, to your rest; for You, O Loving Companion Presence, bestow grace upon grace." Psalm 116: 7
