A Day with Fr. William Meninger “The Process of Forgiveness”

Fr. Meninger is a Trappist monk from Snowmass CO. He is a very vital part of bringing Centering Prayer to the secular world. He has published numerous books and audio presentations related to Centering Prayer, and is a highly sought speaker. In his seminal book, “The Process of Forgiveness” he states “It is extremely important from the very beginning to understand that the primary consideration and motivation for forgiveness is ourselves. We forgive others, in the first place, for our own sake. ... Only when we allow our wounds to heal and let forgiveness occur will we free ourselves from our self-imposed prison cells.” You will not want to miss this opportunity to explore with Fr. Meninger *why* we must forgive and *how* to forgive.

“God does not love us because we are good, but because God is good.”

“All creation is the womb of God – one sacred universe.”

“The Incarnation solved the space problem of separateness.”

“There is no place to go to ‘get transformed’ because we have already got it programmed in our DNA.”

“Contemplative prayer is about receptivity, not passivity.”

Fr Keating, in one of his talks, discussed the different aspects of material, emotional, mental and spiritual beauty.

Not surprisingly, he mentioned that “Silence is the most beautiful of the most beautiful.” Fr Thomas ended by saying that we are “not to receive beauty, but to BE beauty.”

After being delighted and challenged by both Fr’s Rohr and Keating, there was a time of ‘faith-sharing’, another period of centering and a gentle and inspirational closing. The morning sent me forth with a renewed peace and inner stillness as I breathed in the beauty around me and descended the stairs carpeted with pink flower petals.

Contemplative Dying Part II

“Those Who Lose Their Life Will Find It: Contemplative Dying Part II”

Early in February 2008, just a few days before Ash Wednesday -- and directly following the delightful “Sacred Rhythm” morning retreat – a group of San Diego contemplatives gathered once again to ponder several facets of contemplative dying under the guidance of Bryan McNutt, spiritual counselor at the Silverado Hospice and Centering Prayer group facilitator at St. Paul’s Episcopal Cathedral. Bryan offered an apt segue from the morning retreat’s focus on sacred dance with this Kahlil Gibran quote: “*It is only when the earth claims our body that we shall truly dance.*”

As those on the contemplative journey learn, continually consenting to the presence and action of God within leads to an expansive embrace of ambiguity and paradox – the state of awareness that Jesus apparently spoke from when he said “*Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it*” (Mt 10: 39). Jesus’ wisdom is echoed in these words of Thomas Merton thousands of years later: “To enter the realm of the contemplative life, one must, in a sense, die.”

How is it that *finding leads to loss* and that *loss leads to finding*? In one sense, Jesus’ quote speaks to the inextricable connection between life and death and finding and loss. What we “find” with life – be it success, prestige, security – or even intangible riches like love, hope, and joy – are ever-changing and temporal and will inevitably be lost. And yet, all that is lost “*for my sake*” will bring forth life – a deeper way of being rooted in the compassion and wisdom that emerges as we die to the false self and are raised to a new, transformed life in Christ.

As Bryan and several other contemplatives pointed out, death occurs daily in a variety of ways: lost opportunities, a shake-up or shift in our belief system, retirement, the loss of an intimate relationship, the

“empty nest” as children leave home, illness and loss of former health and strength, the recognition of our own flaws and weaknesses ... Rather than avoiding or ignoring such deaths, we might begin to open ourselves to their life-deepening and transformative possibilities by pondering such questions as: What is dying within me? What new expression of my true self is emerging? How might I be a midwife to that true self that is emerging? In discovering the answers to these questions, Bryan explained, we can begin to hold the tension between two seeming opposites – life and death – and allow that tension to invigorate us. We then might discover, as Rinpoche noted, that “death is a mirror that reflects our true self.”

One of the ways of being a “midwife to the true self” – a wise ally during the dying-and-birthing process – is through the ongoing practice of contemplative prayer and the increasingly magnanimous participation in the Spirit-rooted life that it fosters. Thank you yet again, Bryan, for an afternoon of thoughtful exploration and contemplative invitation!

The Sacred Rhythm Retreat

After greeting some friends and sampling the sumptuous refreshment table we began to take a seat in the large circle and to gaze at the graceful sacred environment in the center. A cloud of white cloth hosted three scarlet amaryllis and a trinity of bold red candles amidst flickering votives and translucent red and gold ribbon. Gradually the environment and the gentle guitar music merged quieting us into stillness.

Our Sacred Rhythm Half Day Retreat on February 2nd was God's rhythm of love: a rhythm of beauty, of personal quiet, of peaceful sharing, of evocative chanting, of mindful walking, of creative dancing, and, of course, of yummy eating.

Evie McGreevy began by saying, "I love and trust retreats," and how the words of Christ, "Come with me and rest a while," evoke the mysterious power of God. She continued by describing how the Trinity can be represented as a sacred rhythm in the following way: God is the dance floor; Jesus is the lead partner; and the Holy Spirit is the music. She also reminded us of the symbols of the Trinity in the amaryllis and candles on the altar. Evie then shared an idea from Cynthia Bourgeault's *Wisdom Jesus* about the Trinity. Rather than imagining the Trinity as a triangle, we can see the Trinity as a wheel going round and round with the Father pouring himself into the Son, the Son pouring himself into the Spirit and the Spirit pouring herself into the Father. This creates a dance of self-emptying love transforming the hard and resistant into movement—soft, smooth, and flowing.

Ange Dee then led us in a chant using the words "Be still and know that I am God." Our thin voices soon swelled into a multilayered chord as we repeated the chant letting Ange's beautiful voice ride on ours. The chant then faded and we moved into centering prayer followed by personal silent time either in or out of doors. When we returned we shared some personal thoughts. One participant gave her recollection of Fred Astaire dancing not just on the floor but on the walls and the ceiling. If God is the dance floor, we might not limit that floor to the ground below us. Another participant de-

scribed her necklace; a triangle intertwined with a circle like the two symbols of the Trinity Evie had shared. And then another participant quoted a poem with the line "In the silence of His spirit may we do His will and that only."

Later Ange's evocative music led us in a mindful walk. Evie reminded us of the words of Thich Nhat Hanh who said to walk "as if you are kissing the earth with your feet". During this time, I was especially moved. I had never walked slowly and meditatively before and the repetition of walking around the circle to the music of lyre and chimes lulled my physical senses yet opened others, and I felt a closeness to God in all things. After another period of centering prayer, Elena Andrews simply and gracefully expressed herself in a fluid and inspirational dance. By dancing before us she encouraged us to express ourselves in God's sacred rhythm. She then explained how the Holy Spirit gives us our own rhythm: we no longer have to dance the dance of others. And then we were invited to dance. Some sat, dancing in their hearts, while others found a place in the room and danced spontaneously. .

What a contrast was this retreat from an often noisy world—a world whose rhythm is often not sacred. Our beautiful retreat environment was created by Alicia Annas, Pat Worret, and Elena Andrews. Rebecca Crowley and Janet Williams greeted us at the Welcoming Table, and Sharon Hoffman, Beth Ward and others from the host church, San Dieguito United Methodist church, graciously prepared the food and secured the room. All of these efforts served to bless each and all. How fortunate we are to have so many talented and gracious people willing to make a retreat like this possible. Thank you.

Q and A with Fr. Thomas Keating

Q. *I have been meditating for many years, yet I have no spiritual experience. Can you address that?*

A. Many people meditate because they receive consolation once in a while. Every now and then they get a ray of light or a sense of peace that supports them on the journey. But someone who is not receiving consolations and still perseveres deserves the first prize. John of the Cross is a great help here. One of his major contributions to the knowledge of the spiritual journey is the alternative he describes for the exuberant mysticism of Teresa of Avila. He teaches that there is also a mysticism of pure faith, which he calls the "hidden ladder," which is characterized by darkness and habitual dryness all the way to transforming union. The ladder of pure faith is like taking the back stairs of Teresa's *Interior Castle*. But what difference does it make when you are trying to get to the top of the castle whether you take the main staircase with its gilded banisters or the back stairs assigned to the servants? The main thing is to reach the top. In John of the Cross's view, the Night of Sense does not necessarily lead, as Teresa seems to think, to the exuberant mysticism of the prayer of quiet union and full union. Some and perhaps even most persons who are led into the Night of Sense continue in it until it turns into the Night of Spirit, without a period of profound spiritual consolation.

Ruth Burrows in her book *Guidelines for Mystical Prayer* distinguishes between "lights on" spirituality and a "lights off" spirituality. According to her, both ways lead to the transforming union. Those who go the path of exuberant mysticism (lights on) run the risk of becoming attached to their spiritual experiences. The way of pure faith or the hidden ladder--John of the Cross's contribution to the mystical journey--is a great consolation to people who have spent years on the journey and felt that they got nowhere because they had no consolation. My answer to the question is, "You are very close to the top, just keep going."

Recently, a group of twenty nine individuals from various chapters of Contemplative Outreach came together to participate in a “7 Day Intensive Centering Prayer Retreat” sponsored by the Pacific Coast/West Region of Contemplative Outreach held at the Center for Spiritual Formation in Orange, CA. Marie Howard and Father Carl Arico were the experienced and knowledgeable facilitators who accompanied us as we all became a prayerful community for a week surrounded and supported by the gift of continual silence. Father Carl and Marie guided us through seven days of extended opportunities for Centering Prayer. Father Carl reminded us that coming to prayer signifies our intention to consent to God’s Presence and Action in our lives. They led us in thoughtful, reflective and humorous ways through a number of meaningful videos of Father Thomas Keating. Marie warmly encouraged us to “Listen with the ear of your heart.” and mentioned that there are new and deeper awarenesses brought forth each a video is revisited. Spiritual Direction and Soul Friending were provided for those who chose to sign up. This was offered throughout the retreat and was appreciated by many. The time of Eucharist that ended some days included a meaningful homily that one night included an invitation for retreatants to identify: “What have I become aware of in the last 24 hours that needs to be healed? How did I paralyze myself? What...needs to be forgiven? What...needs to be celebrated? The beautifully landscaped ground at the Center for Spiritual Development showed the evidence of great love, creativity, and tender care from hard-working hands. We all enjoyed walking paths that wound around a large variety of: trees, greenery, plants, and flowers. We were encouraged by Father Carl to “Walk in the Presence of God as the Lord heals us on deep levels.” We also had comfortable rooms and ample food- but the real comfort and nourishment of this intensive retreat came through experiencing a deeper and further understand of the practice of Centering Prayer and a clearer appreciation of being brought into greater intimacy with God as our False Self Programs continue to be evacuated and the Holy Spirit begins to infill those newly opened spaces.
