The Rising Tide of Silence The Life of Fr. Thomas Keating

Over 70 people from CONSD and guests filled the Fellowship Hall at San Dieguito United Methodist Church located in Encinitas, on a beautiful, sunny morning, Saturday, February 22, 2014 to view the film "A Rising Tide of Silence", the life of Father Thomas Keating. We started our day with a period of Centering Prayer and a short film on the *Trinity* as an introduction to the biography of Father Keating. Many people commented that it was a "teaser" for what was to come.

The film is Father Keating's personal story of his life from childhood to the current day. For those of us in attendance that morning we truly felt blessed to know Father Keating's personal story. Our hearts cried for him knowing the pain he suffered in his early years in the monastery. We laughed for joy experiencing his great sense of humor. We were gifted with photos of him as we got a glimpse of his total beauty as a baby, innocence as a young boy, and charisma as a handsome young man.

Father Thomas Keating was born in New York in 1923 to a well do to family in Long Island. His father was a prominent lawyer and his mother a homemaker who cared for Thomas and his sister. Thomas suffered several serious illnesses as a child and had a near death experience very young and at this time had his first common agreement with God to become a priest when he was 21 years of age.

Father Keating attended Yale University in the 1940's and at this time converted to Catholicism. In his first semester he received "D's" because he was studying and reading Tolstoy who also was a Catholic convert. After graduation from Yale, Father Keating entered a Roman Catholic Monastery of the Cistercian order. It was a rocky road entering the monastery and he took the monastic life very seriously. Here he fell in love with the monk idea of "community with God." This was a disappointment to his family and they were totally opposed to a monastic life for him and felt the money spent on his education was a waste. Father Keating became the Abbot of St. Joseph's Abbey in Spencer, Massachusetts in the 1970's and during this time there was great controversy within the monastery that was weighing on him. He eventually resigned and went to St. Benedict's Monastery in Snowmass, Colorado. (Continued on next page)

In 1984, Father Keating co-founded Contemplative Outreach and wanted contemplative prayer to be available to ordinary people living ordinary lives. He believes that this is not just a method of prayer but a relationship with God. God is everything and the goodness is in everything, open to all non-Christians, Protestants, and Roman Catholics worldwide. He also takes this ministry to prisoners, priests, and contemplatives of other religions. Today he remains active in Contemplative Outreach in Snowmass with limited travel engagements, but speaks through modern day teleconferences to the world and teaches via videos.

The film showed Father Keating in interviews and his comments with spiritual leaders throughout the world. The Dalai Lama and Father Keating spoke out on compassion and the spiritual journey in our universe at a conference in Boston, MA. (The photo below is called, "The Kiss" after Father Keating spoke and kissed the Dalai Lama at conference titled 'Beyond Religion: Ethics, Values, and Wellbeing' Sunday, October 14, 2012.).



The film had several of Father Keating's quotes from books he has written and they were all "wonderful!" The film was simple and elegant reminding us we all lead a full active life, we are all seeking a closer relationship with God, and silence is God's first language. We ended the day with faith sharing and valuable discussions.

The half day retreat facilitated by Chris and Sue Hagan provided all of us with a wonderment of what we need to do in our daily lives to prompt our hearts to go into our secret room and pray to our Father in silence. Thank you for another memorable CONSD retreat. Special thanks to Winnie Baumer and her committee for providing us with all the delicious food and love filled hospitality. Thank you to the hard working joyful ladies at the registration table who provided us with a warm welcome. We applaud all of you for making this day so celebratory.

Now to end this article in Father Keating's words, "Christian Contemplative prayer is the opening of mind and heart - our whole being - to God, the Ultimate Mystery, beyond, thoughts, words and emotions, whom we know by faith is within us, closer than breathing, thinking, feeling and choosing; even closer than consciousness itself. The root of all prayer is interior silence." (Open Mind, Open Heart).

Weekly Support Group

Contemplative Outreach United in Prayer Day—March 15, 2014

Over thirty contemplatives from COSD and CONSD gathered at the First Presbyterian Church in El Cajon for a morning of prayer, a DVD, reflection time and faith sharing and discussion. A deeply spiritual DVD "Falling Into The Hands Of God" provided us with an hour of Fr. Keating's wisdom. What follows are some of the beautiful key points on the DVD:

"To fall into the hands of the living God is modified as soon as you realize that, for God, to live is to love. Therefore there is no safer place to be in the world than to be in the hands of God, and to fall into them. It's a gift. You don't really jump; you get pushed, shoved or it just happens. Falling into God is to fall into your life as it is—the good and the difficult without judging or expecting. We are to consent to God's plan and embrace the imperfections of ourselves and our life. God wants us to fall into His hands freely so we chose to fall. God is closer to us than our own sense of being. So this God is awesome, but incredibly tender, close, loving, intimate, fatherly, motherly sisterly, brotherly, friendly, engaged, soul friend, partner, companion, beloved spouse and the ultimate unity. So we are never separated from God. God seems to have a playful side.

What are some of God's favorite games? One is Hide and Seek. We were created with five senses and a thinking capacity. So God has five senses to hide behind the reality that's out there. So we never seen Him physically or if you do it's probably touched up by your imagination or preconceived ideas. God hides behind each sense. He's always present. Why don't we see Him? It's because the inner eye of faith hasn't been sufficiently awakened to perceive the Divine Presence as a source in

everything that exists. We need to fall and let go into God, what is happening and how He's working with you. And as we develop and grow in consciousness and become more mature adults and so on, God begins to work with us in new level of intimacy that might be called the Divine Therapy. God turns out to be the greatest psychoanalysts and psychologist there ever was and vastly exceeds any knowledge He has of your unconscious, regardless of how much cooperation you offer. In Centering Prayer as your mind consciously and deliberately quiets you down, or you are detached for regular periods of time from any thought content, you begin to experience who you really are, which is beyond thinking, beyond any experience, but more real than any experience. So you have to trust God and trust Him almost infinitely. No matter what happens it comes from love. You don't have to jump, just fall. The hands of God are softer and gentler than the best of down cushions or pillows. It's the safest place anybody could ever be. So everything is perfectly organized despite appearances. With the eyes of faith you see God—not with your bodily eyes but with this sense of presence in everything you see. It's Hide and Seek. Sitting still for a period of time or in one place helps to get beyond the preconceived ideas we have of what reality is or should be. Silence teaches you what it actually is, and, as silence deepens it morphs into the Divine Presence and then you see beyond your sense this loving Presence which invites you to fall into the embrace of the Beloved. We must bring our conscious presence to the Divine Presence, our nothingness to the Creator of all that we are—body, soul and spirit—to all that God is.



A Retreat with Fr. William Meninger



On June 21st, 2014
Fr. Meninger will
present a retreat titled "The Four Levels of Prayer" at St.
Bartholomew's Episcopal Church in Poway. In his book
1012 Monastery
Road, Fr. Meninger
tells us that "Prayer
begins with God, not
with us. The invitation has to come

from God – what comes from us is the response. How much easier it is if we approach our prayer from a God-centered perspective, and become aware of our prayer as a response, not as a beginning. When we begin to pray or think of beginning to pray we should be explicitly aware that God has initiated this prayer." Our awareness of God's call to us to be in prayer with Him, to be in a personal relationship with him, matures over time. As Fr.

Meninger says, "prayer is an expression of one's personal relationship with a personal God." Any personal relationship goes through four stages. The first stage is acquaintanceship. It has its own characteristics and its own expression. The second stage is friendship. We have many acquaintances but far fewer friends. Friendship also has its own characteristics. The third stage is affection or the beginnings of true love. Sometimes called puppy love or romantic love, it is in this stage that we see the development of affectivity in the relationship. The fourth stage is true love or contemplative union. We see a delineation of these relationships in John of the Cross' "Ascent to Mount Carmel" and "The Dark Night." During this retreat Fr. Meninger will explore the Four Levels of Prayer within the context of these writings of St. John of the Cross.

Del Mar Prayer Group

Our prayer group meets weekly at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Del Mar.

We have been meeting for a while now and have about eight members who come on a consistent basis --though sometimes more sometimes less. Lori Thomas facilitated the group and stepped down about two years ago, and then I began facilitating. In part our heritage is from John and Mary Wavrick.

We have different religious backgrounds and orientations and some members attend different churches. Some have a bit of a Buddhist perspective, some a scriptural emphasis, and some a liturgical emphasis. We meet and play our ideas off each other. We discuss how we attach to the material and we share our unique perceptions. We follow closely the Guidelines for Centering Prayer groups and when making decisions follow discernment and consensus guidelines.

We sometimes rotate who will be responsible for facilitating a topic we have decided to study.

We are just finishing Father Keating's DVD on The Paschal Mystery and have been reading his book "The Mystery of Christ" which we plan to return to after Easter. I have just received two DVDs from Contemplative Outreach which we will watch in the near future. One is The Practices That Bring The Fruits of Centering Prayer Into Daily Life and the other is Transformation and Centering Prayer: New Paths in Science, Education and Spirituality. Earlier we read the parables in Father Keating's book "Awakenings". We have listened to Father Arico on "Advent" and have watched DVDs of Cynthia Bourgeault. Most of us receive Richard Rohr's daily e-mail meditations.

Father Keating offers a solid foundation of the prayer from which we venture out and return to over and over again. Our discussions have included topics such as the experience of the prayer, the prayer in our daily lives, the purification process and its effects in our daily lives, suffering and transformation, the false self/true self, unitive and dualistic consciousness. We have various interests related to the prayer and recognize that we are different aspects of the elephant; dancing around the still point in our unique way. We are drawn together in our love of the prayer.

We are an "open" group so over the years we have added some new members. Each new person brings his own history and perspective so while accommodating and integrating them into the group we are able to keep our core.

For me, our periods of silent prayer together have been becoming more and more important to our time together.

The Jesuit priest William Johnston in his book "The Mirror Mind" quotes a passage in St. John of the Cross's "The Spiritual Canticle":

Let us rejoice, beloved, And let us go forth To behold ourselves in your beauty

Johnston states "The image of course, is that of the mirror. The soul, looking into the mirror which is the Risen Christ, sees his beauty and, at the same time, see her own beauty." Sometimes it may happen that we reflect that mirror to each other.

CONSD Annual Retreat

CONSD will hold its annual three day retreat at the Prince of Peace Abbey in Oceanside October 17th through October 19th 2014.

The Prince of Peace Abbey is located on a secluded hill overlooking the Pacific Ocean. Driving up the long winding driveway one feels the internal and external busyness of our lives begin to drop away.



During the retreat we will have multiple periods of Centering Prayer each day as well as ample time for private reflection and rest. Silence will be observed from the end of our opening gathering until the Sunday service including meals. Participants are welcome to attend the Abbey's Offices of the Day during the retreat. Participants can avail themselves of the books in the Abbey's library or bring their own material. However, since the primary purpose of the retreat is to further open our hearts to the presence and action of God within participants are encouraged to minimize activities that appeal to the mind. In the spirit of being with God in silence during the retreat we will not have videos. DVD's or lectures.

On Sunday both an Ecumenical service with Communion and a Catholic Mass will be available.



The cost of the retreat is \$170.00 which covers room and meals. A \$50.00 deposit is due by July 17th with the remainder of the fee due at the time of registration. Registrations will also be accepted after July 17th, if rooms are still available, with the total fee due at the time of registration. Please make out your \$50.00 deposit check to Prince of Peace Abbey and mail to CONSD 908 Via Linda, Escondido, CA 92029. There are 32 rooms available. They will be single occupancy rooms unless you desire to have someone you know room with you. All rooms have a bathroom with shower. About Centering Prayer

"Centering Prayer and its conceptual background involve the whole of the teaching which aims at fostering unity of mind and heart, of being and doing. It might be put this way: the purpose of Centering Prayer is to be prepared as practitioners to be moved by the Spirit in all our activities and to become manifestations of God's love in the world.

"The practice and its immediate conceptual background are transformational tools. First, by cultivating interior silence, while opening to the presence of God beyond senses, concepts and activities of the mind, which enables us to listen at ever deepening levels of attentiveness. And second, by submitting to the interior purification of conscious and unconscious motiva-

tions which Centering Prayer initiates under the influence of the Holy Spirit. The essence of Centering Prayer is consenting to God's presence and action within. This consent is the heart and soul of the practice.

"The fruits of Centering Prayer are clearly not due to our efforts but rather to the work of the Spirit in us as we surrender our will to God. A primary way to carry out the work of the Holy Spirit is to take more time for Centering Prayer and to cultivate the awareness of the continuous presence of God in daily life."

The Sound of Sheer Silence

The Lord said to Elijah "Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind there was an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire, and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. 1 Kings 19:11

The "sound of sheer silence", what a seemingly paradoxical description of the presence of God. When we think of a sound we naturally think of something that we can hear. One of the definitions of the word "sheer" is "diaphanous." The definition of "diaphanous" is "lacking definite form, without structure"

and the word "silence" means the absence of any sound."

So, how could Elijah, or for that matter, how can we hear a sound that can not be heard? Fr. Keating's response is that God cannot be perceived by our human faculties. The sound of sheer silence is a different kind of sound, a sound that can only be heard when the internal chatter of our minds and the external noise in our environment are stilled. During Centering Prayer we free ourselves from our attraction to our thoughts and the sounds that surround us. Centering Prayer, then, is a method of prayer that leads us to the sound of sheer silence.
